Program Overview

The Salt Lake County Division of Community Resources and Development (CRD) is seeking applications for projects that are in alignment with the Mayors “Future We Choose” vision for a healthy community – built on healthy people, healthy places, expanded opportunities and responsive government. Funding opportunities that are covered in this handbook include:

1. **Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) “Hard Cost” projects (Housing, Public Facility Improvements, Infrastructure Improvements and Economic Development).** *Funds will be used to provide a suitable living environment including affordable decent housing and revitalized neighborhoods by expanding economic opportunities primarily for low-to-moderate income (LMI) persons.*
2. **Community and Support Service Programs (SSBG, ESG & CDBG Public Services funds).** *Funds will be used to increase job growth, expand educational opportunities, and foster healthier families by addressing the identified education and income needs as well as fundamental housing, food, health, and safety concerns.*

Salt Lake County’s Federal Grant Funds are administered and monitored through the County’s Community Resources and Development Division which is operated under the Office of Regional Development.

All applications must comply with the HUD Community Development Block Grant Program Federal Regulations at 24 CFR Part 570 for the CDBG Program; 24 CFR Part 572 for the Emergency Solutions Grant Program; the provisions of the Social Services Block Grant Act, 42 U.S.C. § 1397 et seq. (the “Act”); and all relevant federal, state, and local laws; which are described briefly in this document.

C. Funding Priorities

The funding priorities that have been identified are a result of an ongoing comprehensive analysis which factors in literature reviews of multiple needs assessments, public needs hearing process, and internal stakeholder meetings. The identified needs have been aligned with the objectives of multiple funding sources, including: HUD criteria for CDBG, ESG and HOME funds; the purposes of the Social Services Block Grant program (SSBG), the priorities that have been determined by members of the Salt Lake County Consortium; and the goals of the Salt Lake County Mayor and the Mayors of the cities and towns in the Urban County. All funded activities must be consistent with priorities outlined in the Salt Lake County Consortium Consolidated Plan.

Salt Lake County will continue to place a very strong emphasis on measuring the impact of programs, and linking funding to desired outcomes. New for FY17 is a narrowed scope of performance indicators that will be tracked by the Office of Regional Development, and specified goals that must be measured by programs that are awarded funds under this Request for Applications.

One of the initiatives of the Salt Lake County Mayor is the "Partnership for a Greater Salt Lake", which is about bringing people together from both the public and private sectors to develop common sense solutions to some of the community's biggest challenges. Regional Development is one of four focus areas under this initiative. The discussions to-date of the Partnership for a Greater Salt Lake - Regional Development committee have framed the issues and the funding priorities for FY17, which include: Regional Jobs; Regional Housing; Regional Transportation and Inclusive Economy. These priorities are further aligned with the desired CRD long-term outcomes of Choice in Housing Options, Healthy Homes, Homeless to be Housed, Individuals and Families to be Self-Supported through Sufficient Earnings, Individuals and Families to be Stabilized and Safe, and Neighborhood Revitalization.

E. Additional Eligibility Requirements

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) “Hard Costs”

Federal Regulations require that CDBG funds be used for eligible activities that meet one of three National Objectives:

- 1. Benefit to low-to moderate income (LMI) persons**
(Often referred to as the “primary objective” since agencies must show a benefit to LMI persons whether based on limited clientele or an area benefit.)
- 2. Aid in the prevention or elimination of slum or blight**
(The focus is a change in the physical environment of a deteriorating area)
- 3. Urgent Need**
(This National Objective is designed ONLY for activities that alleviate emergency conditions typically caused by a natural disaster. Use of this objective is rare.)

Additionally, HUD identifies criteria for how an activity may be considered to benefit LMI persons:

- **Area Benefit** (at least 51% of the residents must meet criteria for LMI)
- ***Limited clientele** (activities benefit clientele that are at least 51% LMI or benefits a group that is principally “presumed” by HUD to be mostly LMI (abused children, elderly persons, battered spouses, homeless persons, severely disabled adults, illiterate adults, persons living with AIDS and migrant farm workers).
- ***Housing**, (at least 51% of the units will be occupied by LMI households)
- Those involving employment ***(Job Creation)** (at least 51% are available to LMI persons)

****Third Party Verification of income is required to qualify a person documented as LMI for activities benefiting clientele for housing and job creation based on household size and income.***

A low-to-moderate income persons (LMI) is defined as a member of a household having an income equal to or less than the Section 8 Housing Assistance Payments Program low income limits (those whose income is at or below 80% of the local area median) established by HUD applicable to the size of the persons household.

The Area Median Income is determined for a family of four by HUD and is based on US Census Data. The median income for Salt Lake County for 2016 is \$73,800. The figures below help to determine eligibility for the CDBG program along with many other programs funded by Salt Lake County.

Proposals submitted for CDBG “Hard Cost” must be for activities located within the eligible Urban County (as defined below) or demonstrate the clients served, for which County CDBG funds will be used, reside within the eligible geographical areas of the County. The Urban County includes the cities of Alta, Bluffdale, Cottonwood Heights, Draper, Herriman, Holladay, Midvale, Millcreek, Murray, Riverton, and South Salt Lake as well as the Metro Townships and the balance of the unincorporated county.

Residents of the cities of Salt Lake, Sandy, South Jordan, Taylorsville, West Jordan, and West Valley are **not** considered residents of the Urban County.

Projects/programs must also align with the needs and priorities outlined in the Salt Lake County Consolidated Plan along with meeting one of HUD’s National Objectives and providing a benefit to LMI persons living in an eligible geographical area of Salt Lake County.

Persons who are homeless are eligible for services regardless of where they are receiving temporary shelter or services in all of Salt Lake County.

Requests for funding must be identified as an eligible CDBG activity. Funding for CDBG “hard cost” must be a “brick & mortar” activity, acquisition of real property, public improvement including facility improvements, infrastructure or ADA improvements or economic development through the use of microenterprise.

Community and Support Services (SSBG, ESG & CDBG Public Services)

- **CDBG recipients** must provide activities that serve clients at or below 80% AMI, who live in the “Urban County” area. For 2016-17 this includes the Metro Townships, the balance of the Unincorporated County, Alta, Bluffdale, Cottonwood Heights, Draper, Herriman, Holladay, Midvale, Millcreek City, Murray, Riverton and South Salt Lake City.
- **ESG recipients** must ensure that clients receiving Homeless Prevention Assistance have incomes at or below 30% AMI.
- **SSBG recipients** must have documented established guidelines for serving low and moderate income households.

F. Who May Apply

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) “Hard Costs”

County Agencies and the Non-Entitlement Cities may submit proposals for infrastructure projects within the Urban County. This includes the Metro Townships and the balance of the Unincorporated County and areas within the boundaries of each of the respective Cities.

Participating Cities, Non-Profit Agencies (501c3) and Quasi-government agencies may submit proposals for Facility Improvements, Housing Services and Economic Development.

Community and Support Services (SSBG, ESG & CDBG Public Services)

Non-Profit organizations and government entities which directly provide human services to Salt Lake County residents are eligible to submit proposals. However, government entities will not be considered for CDBG and/or ESG funding. All non-profit entities must submit proof of existing 501c3 status in order to be eligible to apply for funding.

G. Estimated Available Funding

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) “Hard Costs”

Funding for this competitive grant process is contingent upon the congress passing a FY2017 appropriation bill for the CDBG program. All funding amounts are estimates and are subject to change.

Estimated Community Development Block Grant for the Urban County: \$1,872,218

The County will be looking for all resources that may be available for the programs to ensure maximum leverage for all program dollars.

Community and Support Services (SSBG, ESG & CDBG Public Services)

Funding for this competitive grant process is contingent upon the Congress passing a FY2017 appropriation bill for these programs. Any approved funds awarded by the County will not be available until the beginning of FY17-18 or approximately July 1, 2017.

Part H

H. Application Process and Review Criteria

Applications for all three funding opportunities must be submitted online through ZoomGrants™. Incomplete, hand-delivered, emailed, mailed, faxed, or late applications will be deemed ineligible.

Proposals will be initially screened to ensure that the agency and the program meet basic eligibility qualifications, and that the submission was made prior to the deadline.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) “Hard Costs”

Accepted applications will be reviewed by the members of the Salt Lake County Community and Economic Development Advisory Council (CEDAC) who will individually score and rank each proposal using the evaluation criteria identified in Appendix B, of the “2017-2018 CDBG Hard Cost Project Application”. The CRD Staff may request additional information on behalf of the CEDAC from applicants while reviewing their proposals. A request for additional information does not imply a commitment for funding recommendations. The CEDAC will make funding recommendations to the Salt Lake County Mayor based on the score and ranking. The County Mayor in combination with all the Mayors in the Urban County and the Municipal Services District (MSD) Manager will hold one Public Hearing to get community feedback on the recommendations before making a final decision on grant awards for FY 2017-18.

Community and Support Services (SSBG, ESG & CDBG Public Services)

Accepted proposals will be reviewed by the members of the Salt Lake County Community and Support Services Advisory Council (CSSAC) who will individually score and rank each proposal using the evaluation criteria identified in Appendix E, of the “2017-2018 Community and Support Service Grants (SSBG, ESG, CDBG Public Services) Application”. The CRD Staff may request additional information on behalf of the CSSAC from applicants while reviewing their proposals. A request for additional information does not imply a commitment for funding recommendations. The CSSAC will make funding recommendations to the Salt Lake County Mayor based on the score and ranking. The County Mayor in combination with all the Mayors in the Urban County and the Municipal Services District (MSD) Manager will hold one Public Hearing to get community feedback on the recommendations before making a final decision on grant awards for FY 2017-18.

A. Procedures to Appeal Eligibility Decisions

Pursuant to Salt Lake County Code of Ordinances §3.25.000, persons who are aggrieved over the request for applications (RFA) award may submit an appeal in writing to the Program Administrator within seven (7) calendar days after notification of the award is posted on the county's website and in ZoomGrants™. An appeal may be amended and/or supplemented during the seven calendar days after notification of the award is posted, but shall not amend and/or supplement its appeal after the expiration of that time period. An aggrieved applicant may file only one (1) appeal after the closing date for applications. Appeal letters must specifically and completely state the facts that constitute the error in the applications process or the award and the desired remedy. After review of the appeal, the program administrator shall make a recommendation to the mayor who shall make a final determination on the appeal.

B. Overview of Evaluation Criteria

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) “Hard Costs”

Each proposal will be reviewed in part by how well the proposed project addresses a community development need and the degree to which the proposed project furthers a strategy or goal identified in the Salt Lake County Consolidated Plan. The review process will consist primarily of ranking and scoring proposals based on information provided in the “Eligibility Requirements” and “Application Questions” sections found in the ZoomGrants™ Application for the 2017-2018 CDBG "Hard Cost" Projects. The evaluation tool located in Appendix B of the application will be used by the Citizen Review Committee to review and score each proposal. Each review committee will base their opinions of your application on how well the agency addresses the requested elements in each section.

Community and Support Services (SSBG, ESG & CDBG Public Services)

Expectation of Outcomes

Salt Lake County is responding to the demand for increased accountability for taxpayer dollars through a commitment to evidence-based outcomes. Community and Support Services Programs that receive funding in FY17 must be prepared to utilize standardized measurement tools, and to collect and report specific data that will demonstrate measurable short-term progress towards long-term outcomes. It is anticipated that grant recipients will be able to track achievements within their programs in FY17, and that successes related to common indicators will ultimately be substantiated across service delivery systems.

Appendix C of the ZoomGrants™ Application for the 2017-2018 Community and Support Services Grants (SSBG, ESG, CDBG Public Services) provides comprehensive details on the Outcomes and Performance Indicators that will be expected in FY17 proposals. Appendix E provides the Scoring Criteria and the Evaluation Tool that will be used by the Allocation Committee to review and score each proposal.

Salt Lake County Community Resources & Development is offering incentives for the FY17 grant cycle to encourage agencies that have identified partnerships with other organizations AND have the ability to track client progress across service delivery systems, to submit collaborative applications for the Community & Support Service Grants (SSBG, ESG & CDBG Public Services). Collaborative applications may be awarded up to 10 bonus points during the review process, and agencies with successful proposals may have the opportunity to extend the contract period of performance to 24 months instead of 12 months. C. Collective Impact on Homelessness

Under the leadership of Mayor Ben McAdams, Salt Lake County – together with the State of Utah and local governments, businesses, nonprofit partners and funders – is coordinating a county-wide effort to improve how our community delivers services to individuals and families who are experiencing or at risk for homelessness. To tackle this complex issue, we are using a collective impact approach. This approach calls for our community to align efforts by abandoning isolated agendas in favor of a common vision, shared outcomes and measurements, and fidelity to shared data, results, and accountability. To guide efforts, Mayor McAdams convened a Collective Impact on Homelessness Steering Committee in early 2015. The Committee has adopted a common vision and unanimously recommends 14 strategically linked outcomes to help us redesign our homeless service system and align funding so that we reach our collective vision.

Salt Lake County Community Resources & Development is requesting that all grant applicants who provide services to those who are homeless consider the impact that their programs will have on achieving these outcomes. For the FY17 grant cycle, applicants that provide homeless services are asked to identify how program goals align with the Collective Impact Steering Committee Outcome Measures. More information on the steering committee and the proposed action plan can be found at: <http://slco.org/homeless-services/collective-impact-on-homelessness>. We anticipate that in the future, those who are awarded funds will be required to report on additional indicators related to the homeless service system and progress towards the Collective Impact Steering Committee Priority Outcomes.

Agencies that receive funding from Salt Lake County ESG, CDBG or SSBG funds in FY17 (that have identified in their application that the agency delivers homeless services) must adopt or comply with the resolution of the Collective Impact on Homelessness Steering Committee, and must also work with the Coordinated Entry lead agency to participate in the Coordinated Intake system.

D. Salt Lake County Needs Assessment

In 2013, Salt Lake County completed a comprehensive needs assessment to gain a better understanding of the needs of low-to moderate income households in the county. The Mayor and the Division of Community Resources and Development have used this information to prioritize the allocation of the limited resources available through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) and the Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) funding received by Salt Lake County. It included an extensive review of prior needs assessments and was an inclusive process involving agency and public feedback which identified the top four needs of LMI households in Salt Lake County. The needs assessment identified four areas of highest priority of low-to-moderate income (LMI) residents of Salt Lake County.

SECTION II: APPLICATION CONSIDERATIONS

The needs identified through this process were incorporated into the Salt Lake County Consolidated Plan. It is used to determine the funding priorities for the Community Development Block Grant, The Emergency Solutions Grant, and the HOME Investment Partnership grant funds. The objectives and outcomes outlined in the Consolidated Plan are listed below.

E. Consolidated Plan & HUD Outcome Performance Measurement System

The objective of the Salt Lake County Consortium Consolidated Plan is to identify the greatest needs in Salt Lake County, and through a public process and public input, with input from a variety of agencies and organizations, develop a five-year strategy to address and mitigate the greatest needs. The 2015-2019 plan is available for review in the Library documents of the 2016-2017 Applications for all three programs referenced in this handbook. A summary of the Priority Needs and the Associated HUD Goals are listed below. Further details on the Priority Level, the Populations to be Served, the Geographic Areas Affected and the Description of the objective and activities to be funded can be found on pages 80-91 of the 2015-2019 Salt Lake County Consortium Consolidated Plan.
