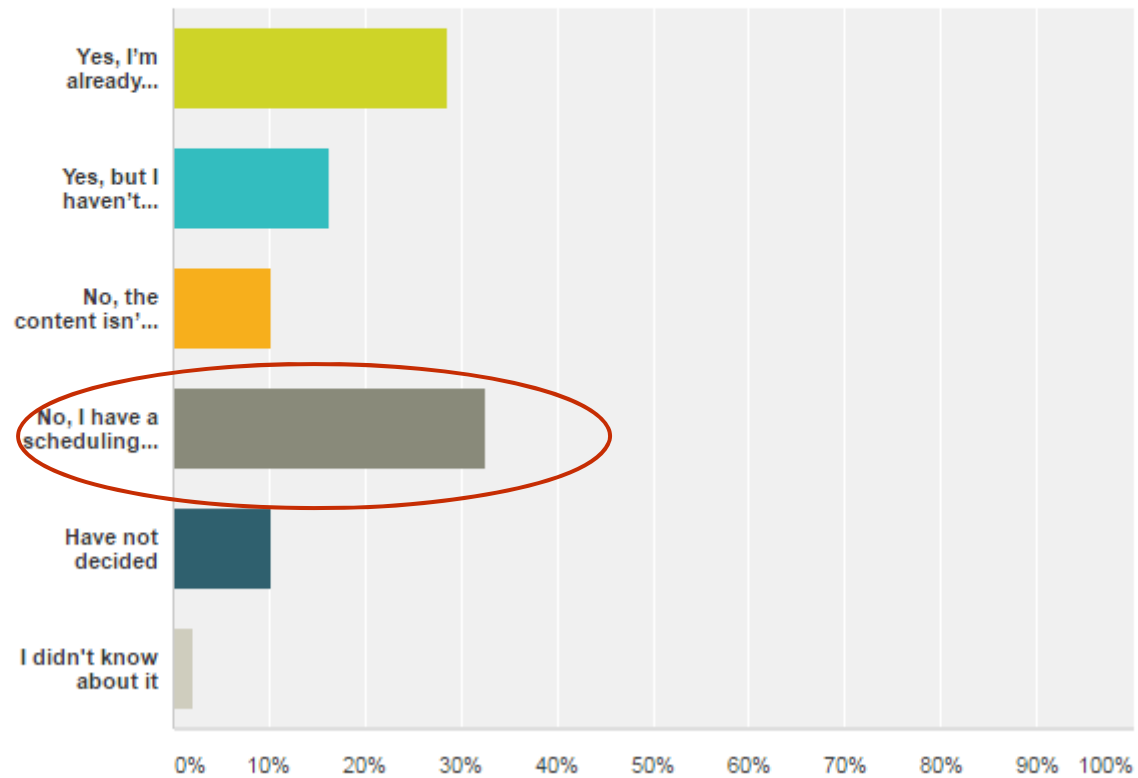

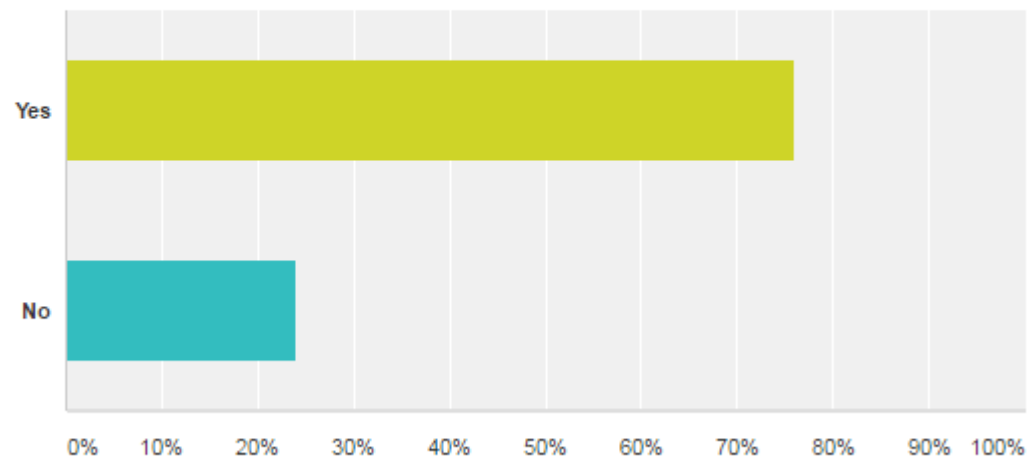

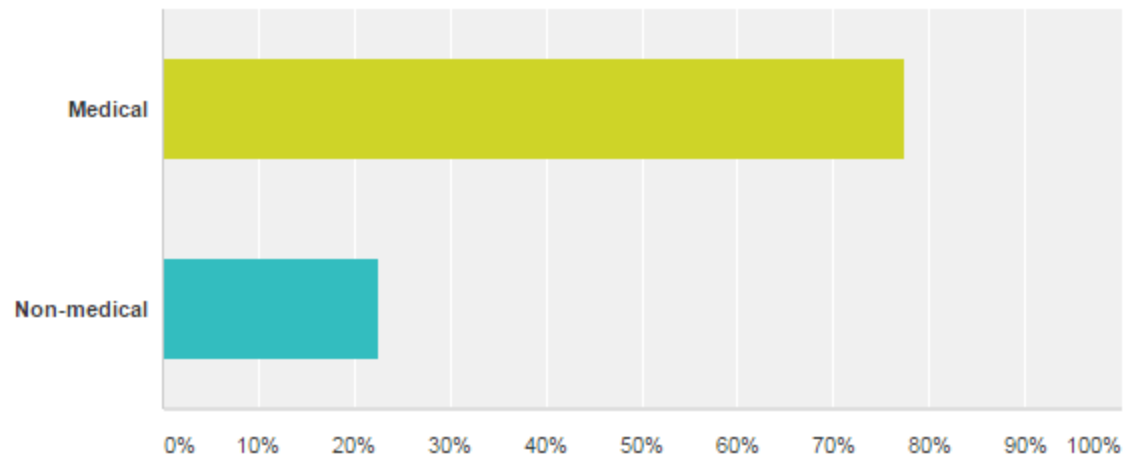
Did you receive the January issue of the newsletter, The MRC Response?

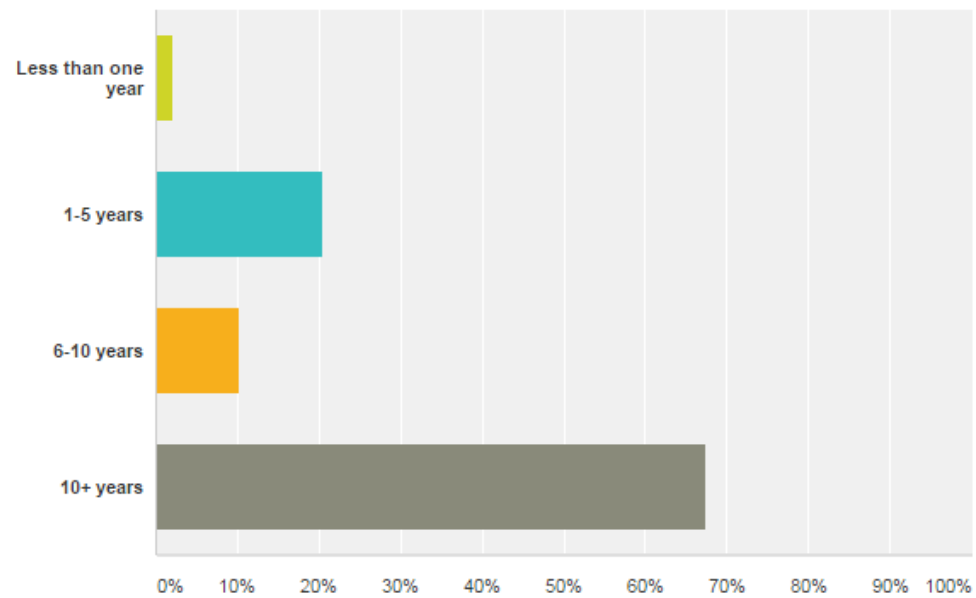
As it relates to your volunteer service with the MRC, do you consider your skills and experience to be:

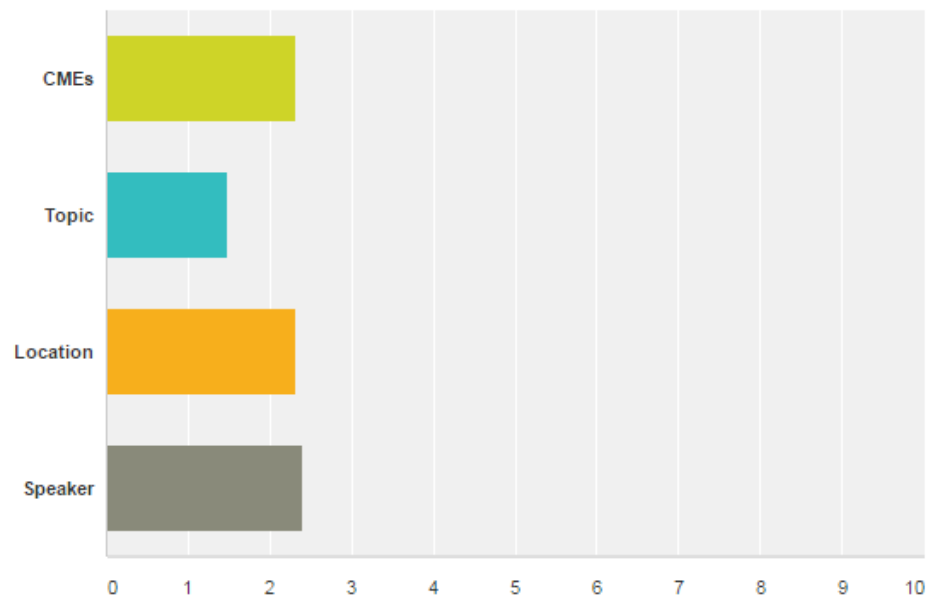
How many years of experience do you have related to the skillset you bring to the MRC?

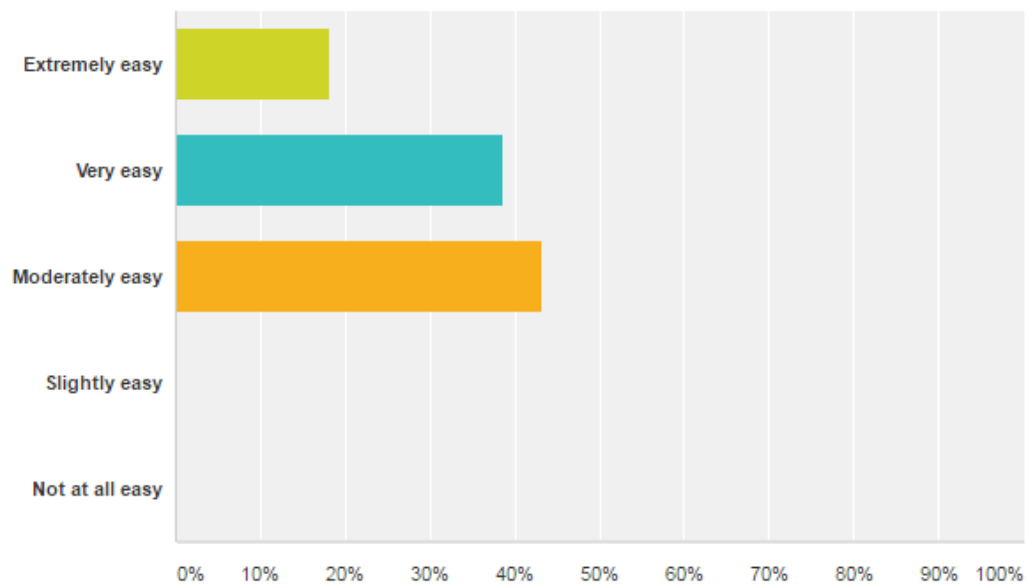
Please rate your priorities when choosing professional training/education:

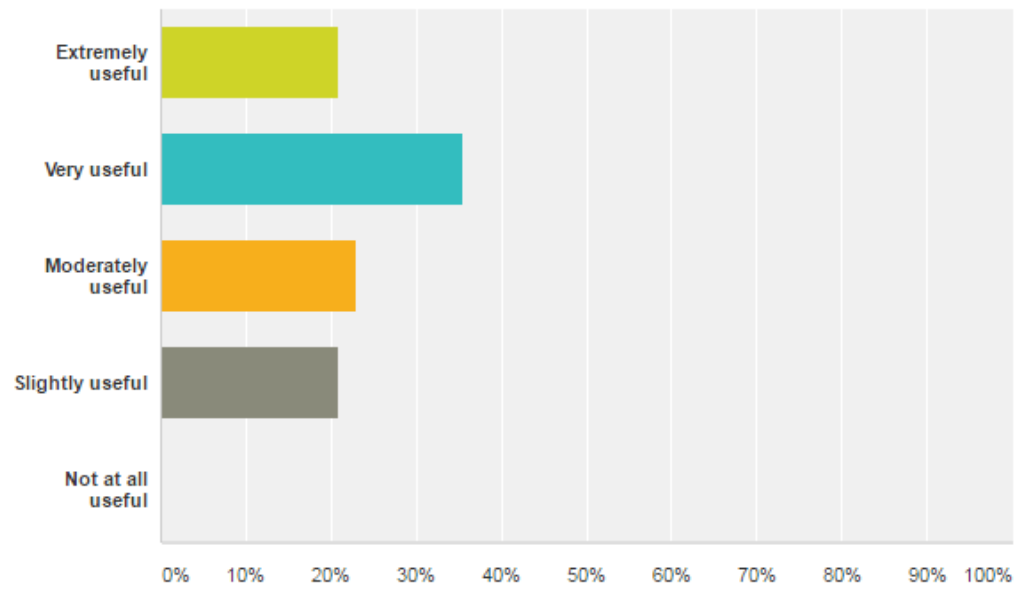
Considering your past service with the MRC, how meaningful was the volunteer work you did?

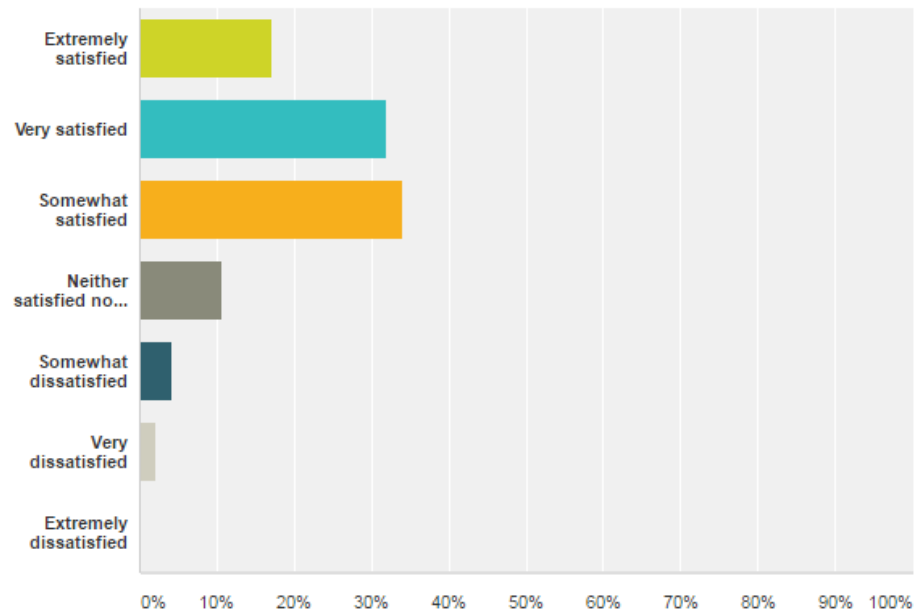
Considering your past service with the MRC, how useful were the volunteer training sessions?

Answered: 48 Skipped: 1



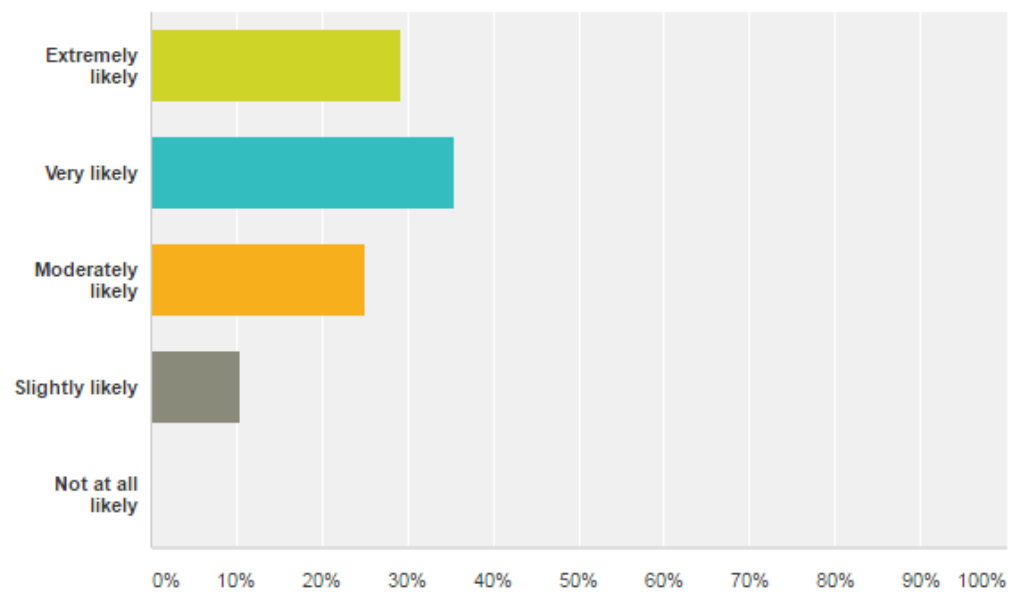
Overall, how satisfied have you been with your volunteer experience with the MRC?

We augment the efforts of medical staff at local hospitals and emergency centers by providing a pre-organized and rapid response to medical surge emergencies.

We coordinate our efforts within the health department, professional organizations, local governments and hospitals, as well as statewide and national emergency response teams to ensure that our response is as timely and effective as possible.

- Splinting and bandaging.

What topics would you like to see for future training events?

- Medical problems.
- Setting up a Pod or assisting in a Pod drill.
- Active Shooter Drill and other drills Corps and Cross Training or drill.
- Triage and treatment of patients in the field.
- Home bound senior planning and care.
- Homeless and mentally ill population needs and planning.
- Updating of CPR.
- Triage and injury management; Suturing/wound packing and closure; Cold weather injury/Heat injury management.
- Anything that would improve ones skills in a MCI event.
- HAZMAT
- EMT

What topics would you like to see for future training events?

- **Disaster preparedness training/drills - can't get enough prep for live event!**
- **First aid skills.**
- **First responder expectations.**
- **Pediatric management in triage.**
- **On hands training.**
- **Pharmacy related topics such as immunizations or emergency medication distribution.**
- **How to be mentally prepared to be dispatched.**
- **Management of radiation exposure.**
- **Since MRC will supplement agencies and health providers in the event of a disaster, it would be nice to have more training put on by those providers to help us be prepared to meet their expectations.**
