

### Salt Lake CoC Racial and Ethnic Disparity Analysis Summary

The following are the results of an analysis of racial and ethnic data for clients enrolled Salt Lake CoC programs in HMIS from 10/1/2016 to 9/30/2017

The majority of racial and ethnic minorities make up a disproportionately high percentage of those receiving services when compared to Salt Lake County 2017 Census Projections

- Black or African Americans have 560% greater representation in the homeless population than the general population
- American Indian or Alaskan Natives have 400% greater representation in the homeless population than the general population
- Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islanders have 129% greater representation in the homeless population than the general population
- Hispanic/Latino individuals have 121% greater representation in the homeless population than the general population

Racial and ethnic disparities in enrollment in services varies based on project type

- Minorities are over represented in day center, emergency shelter, rapid rehousing when comparing those enrolled in the project type to all those receiving homeless services
- Majorities are over represented in homeless prevention, permanent supportive housing, street outreach, and transitional housing when comparing those enrolled in the project type to all those receiving homeless services

Racial and ethnic minorities make up a disproportionately high percentage of those exiting to permanent and temporary destinations

- Whites make up only 64% of those exiting to permanent destinations, yet make up 74% of those receiving services and 88% of the county's population
- All racial minorities make up a greater percentage of those exiting to permanent destinations than they do of those receiving services or of the general population
- Non-Hispanic/Latinos make only 71% of those exiting to permanent destinations, yet make up 77% of those receiving services and 82% of the county's population
- Hispanic/Latinos make 29% of those exiting to permanent destinations, yet make up only 22% of those receiving services and 18% of the county's population
- Whites make up only 70% of those exiting to permanent destinations, yet make up 74% of those receiving services and 88% of the county's population
- All racial minorities make up a greater percentage of those exiting to permanent destinations than they do of those receiving services or of the general population

It is harder to find correlations between race and ethnicity and length of stay in emergency shelter

To answer the NOFA questions, people of different races or ethnicities are more or less likely to receive homeless assistance AND to receive a positive outcome from homeless assistance.
