Connection to Collective Impact


The Collective Impact on Homelessness Steering Committee adopted 14 strategically linked outcomes as priorities. This includes the outcome that we have a coordinated entry system and a “no wrong door” policy in place.

We want homeless and housing services to be better integrated with each other and with other public and private systems, such as a health and human services, job training and employment services, legal services, and public education.

A top Salt Lake County priority in 2017 is to provide the resources need to realized this outcome

CES Guiding Principles

General Principles:

- Homelessness is rare, brief, and non-recurring
- **Shift from a crisis-based systems to a prevention-based and housing stability-focused system.** This will be embodied from moving from a shelter-based system to service-based system.
- Client choice and will inform options for services, housing and referrals

- Assessment and Prioritization
- Matching and Referral
- Governance, Management, Data and Evaluation
