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Homelessness in Salt Lake County

~\$52+ million annually
in government and private funds
for specific direct services

Both true:

Homeless individuals and Salt Lake County residents deserve
a homeless services system that we can demonstrate
uses these resources for greatest impact.



Currently: \$52 Million for Isolated Impact

- Individual funders select individual grantees that offer individual solutions.
- Individual grantees work alone and sometimes compete to provide services they think will have impact based on their mission and expertise.
- Evaluation, if it occurs, isolates and measures individual grantee impact.
- Isolated evaluation is based on individual grantee processes or outputs and rarely on homeless populations (plural) served; can sometimes work as a disincentive to systemic change.
- Efforts of funders are disconnected. They have no common understanding or way to measure progress.

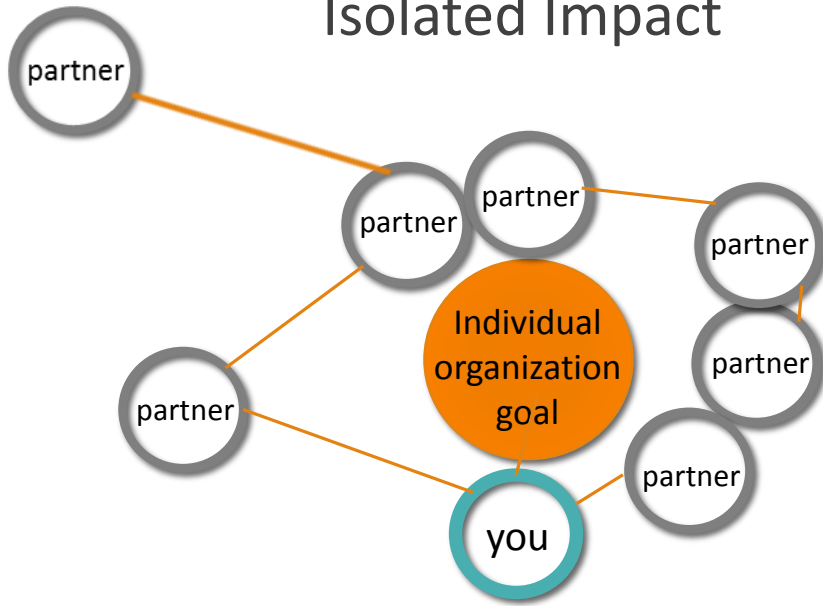


Goal: \$52 Million for Collective Impact

- Coordinated funding sources align with coordinated services across the system to fund collective solutions.
- Individual grantees work together and coordinate to provide services they think will have the greatest collective impact on solving the problem of homelessness.
- Evaluation *always* occurs using shared data and indicators.
- Evaluation is based on progress toward collective outcomes; funding *always* works as an incentive to systemic change.
- Efforts of funders and providers are connected. They have a common understanding of the problem, what progress looks like, and a way to measure it.

Next Steps

- Aug - Dec: Work Groups refine shared indicators and baseline data
- Aug – Dec Salt Lake County aligns its funding with collective impact outcomes and seeks funding partners who will also align funding with outcomes
- Sept – Nov: Steering Committee presents initial recommendations for outcomes, indicators and baseline data to the public and all key stakeholders for feedback
- Nov – Jan: Steering Committee and Work Groups refine work for final recommendation to Salt Lake County Mayor, Salt Lake County Council, and COG
