Change in the local enforcement of laws around homeless service providers.

Our count of individuals in emergency shelter decreased by 265 from last year, while our count of those in transitional housing increased by 47. As a result, our sheltered count decreased by 218 individuals.

Some of this decrease can be attributed to the greater resources put into diversion services. We now have diversion specialists operating out of the majority of our shelters and our day center, who seek to help individuals who are about to check into shelter find another place to stay for the night. Our shelters are also using these same techniques to help those who have already entered shelter find another place to stay in an effort to decrease the length of time spent in shelter. These efforts have seen increasing success and would decrease the number of individuals we would expect to see in an emergency shelter on a given night.

There has also been a change in approach to law enforcement around our largest emergency shelter, which may have led some individuals to not seek shelter on the night of the count. There has also been greater disbursement of individuals throughout the county and away from the main shelter.

Additionally, we have added 44 additional beds to our Permanent Supportive Housing programs and 224 additional beds to our Rapid Rehousing Programs, all of which are being highly utilized. These additional resources reduce the demands placed on our emergency shelters.

There have been increased collaborations with service providers, Salt Lake City, and the Salt Lake City Police department to help coordinate efforts to assist unsheltered individuals access needed resources. The newly formed Community Connection Center operated by the Salt Lake City Police department provided access to treatment and housing resources to unsheltered homeless individuals. There has also been an increase in rapid rehousing and permanent supportive housing capacity. This, combined with continued community efforts around outreach and prioritization of vulnerable unsheltered individuals has helped decrease the number of unsheltered individuals in our community.
